Enclosed please find a copy of Substitute Bill No. 484 (COR), "AN ACT TO AMEND §16125 OF CHAPTER 16, DIVISION 3 OF TITLE 17 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO EXEMPTING RESIDENTS OF GUAM WHO ARE FIFTY-FIVE (55) YEARS OF AGE OR OLDER FROM PAYING TUITION AT THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM", which I have signed into law today as Public Law No. 24-151.

This legislation allows senior citizens to attend University of Guam classes, free of charge, if space permits. This means that young people who may be attending classes full time will have the opportunity to interact with older persons who will most certainly have a different prospective to offer. At the same time, older persons will enrich their lives through learning and interacting with other students.

The legislation, while creating a mandate to the University without its participation or decision, is not foreseen to create a financial burden because the participation of students aged 55 and older is on a space available basis, or by permission of the instructor.

AN ACT TO AMEND §16125 OF CHAPTER 16, DIVISION 3 OF TITLE 17 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO EXEMPTING RESIDENTS OF GUAM WHO ARE FIFTY-FIVE (55) YEARS OF AGE OR OLDER FROM PAYING TUITION AT THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Finding and Intent. The Guam Legislature finds that residents of Guam who are fifty-five (55) years of age or older are exempt from tuition cost in attending the Guam Community College, but not at the University of Guam. Members of this esteemed group, many of whom are now retired, have through their life long efforts made Guam the Community it is today. It is the intent of the Guam Legislature to extend the free tuition benefits that students who are fifty-five (55) years of age or older enjoy at the Guam Community College to those attending or wanting to attend the University of Guam.

Section 2. Section 16125 of Chapter 16, Division 3 of Title 17 of the Guam Code Annotated is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 16125. Residents of the CNMI, the FSM, the Republic of Palau, and the Republic of the Marshall Islands; Advanced Placement Program; Residents of Guam Fifty-five (55) Years of Age or Older. (a) Students who are residents of the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of Palau or the Republic of the Marshall Islands, enrolled in and matriculating at the University of Guam, shall be charged resident tuition for their attendance at the University of Guam.

(b) No tuition shall be levied upon any student admitted to study under the Advanced Placement Program.

(c) No tuition shall be levied upon any resident of Guam admitted who is fifty-five (55) years of age or older, provided that admission into a course(s) shall be on a space available basis or, if a course(s) is full, by permission of the instructor(s). Participation pursuant to this subsection shall require that the enrollee be a resident of Guam for no less than five (5) years preceding enrollment."

Public Hearing:

The Committee on Education held a public hearing on Tuesday, February 10, 1998 at 10:00 a.m. in the Legislative Public Hearing Room on referred **Bill No. 484**: "AN ACT TO AMEND §16125 OF TITLE 17 GUAM CODE ANNOTATED RELATIVE TO EXEMPTING RESIDENTS OF GUAM WHO ARE FIFTY-FIVE (55) YEARS OF AGE OR OLDER FROM TUITION LEVIED UPON STUDENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM." Public Notice was given in the February 5th and 8th issue of the Pacific Daily News.

Summary of Testimonies:

Mr. John M. Phillips, President of the National Association of Retired Federal Employees submitted written testimony in addition to his oral support of Bill No. 484. Mr. Phillips, who is also a senior citizen, expressed the need for seniors to enhance their knowledge, which in turn enhances their lives. As an educator, Mr. Phillips stated how he welcomes seniors into his classes. He believes that they provide real life experiences and maturity to young students. Mr. Phillips further stated that seniors attending classes are at no cost to the University. He stated that the seats are empty, so the seniors do not deprive the young of an educational opportunity. In addition, instruction and overhead are already paid for. He believes that the University gains as the senior pays fees and purchases books and supplies, providing income to the University.

Mr. Joseph Rhatigan also offered written testimony in support of the bill. Mr. Rhatigan recognized that nowadays, a person retires at the age of 65 years old and often seeks out a second lifetime job not as strenuous as the first. In addition, he further stated that the opportunity for Seniors to improve their minds and state of

being will encourage them to continue to be good and energetic citizens of the community. He concluded his testimony by encouraging the senators present to pass the bill unanimously.

Mr. Jesse Leon Guerrero, Vice Chairman representing the University's Board of Regents provided both oral and written testimony in favor of Bill No. 484. Mr. Leon Guerrero stated that this proposition is consistent with a long standing policy of the University. He mentioned that recent fiscal constraints caused the Board to reevaluate the policy although no changes have been made. Mr. Leon Guerrero stated that the present costs of the tuition waiver plan now amounts to approximately \$50,000.00 per academic year. He suggested that since the bill calls for a statutory tuition exemption, that an appropriation provision to cover the cost of implementation be included in the present bill. He further recommended that the provisions of Section 2 be further amended so that resident tuition be charged to residents of the outer islands only in the event that their respective institutions of higher learning reciprocate with an identical program for Guam residents.

Mr. Segundo Aguon, Director of Servicio Para I ManAmko, provided the Committee with written testimony in support of Bill No. 484. Mr. Aguon stated that SPIMA is not very clear on the number of senior citizens who are local residents and who would like to pursue education at the University. He did state however, that many of their residents 60 years and older fall in the low to moderate income category and would not be able to pay for the costs of tuition, fees and books. He further stated that the profile of senior citizens is changing, and that they believe that many would want to pursue further education after retirement. Mr. Aguon believes that such education will provide opportunities and incentives to our seniors to encourage them to continue contributing their vast knowledge and skills to our community.

Mr. Dennis Rodriguez, Director of the Department of Public Health and Social Services submitted written testimony in support of Bill No. 484. Mr. Rodriguez stated that such legislation will allow our senior citizens to continue stimulating their minds and learn changes from our ever growing and dynamic society. He further added that their presence in the classrooms can contribute in several ways: first and foremost, their life experiences enrich classroom discussions and secondly, their acculturation to new ideas and practices bridges our generations. It is the position of the Department that tuition, as well as student fees be waived to those age fifty-five (55) years and older.

Mr. Jesus L. Perez provided written testimony in favor of Bill No. 484. Mr. Perez is an example of a senior citizen currently taking advantage of the senior citizen tuition exemption policy. He is pursuing a Master of Public Administration at the University and plans on graduating after the 1998 spring semester. Mr. Perez stated that the tuition exemption policy is both good and beneficial to the senior citizens as well as to the island. The opportunity for our seniors to stimulate their minds and well being will allow for them to continue to be productive citizens of our community.

Mr. Tom Barcinas, a citizen and member of the American Association of Retired Persons, testified orally in support of Bill No. 484. Mr. Barcinas stated that many citizens over the age of 55 are still employed and contributing to our community. He further stated that additional education will allow these seniors to be more efficient at work or prepare them for an alternative occupation. He emphasized that the senior citizens of today are a very active group in the community and want to continue to be this way. Some seniors may want to take additional courses at the University because they are short a few credits of a degree, or to help them with their volunteer jobs within the community, or simply for enrichment purposes. He concluded by reiterating is support for the bill and urged the Committee to do likewise.

Mr. Ivan Carbullido, a private citizen, offered oral testimony in support of the intent of Bill No. 484. Mr. Carbullido, however, expressed his concern as to the cost of implementing this program and whether the appropriate funding would be available.

Findings

The Committee on Education, to which was referred Bill No. 484: "AN ACT TO AMEND §16125 OF TITLE 17 GUAM CODE ANNOTATED RELATIVE TO EXEMPTING RESIDENTS OF GUAM WHO ARE FIFTY-FIVE (55) YEARS OF AGE OR OLDER FROM TUITION LEVIED UPON STUDENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM," finds that by extending the free tuition benefits to those senior citizens desiring to attend the University, the education derived by these seniors will contribute to their well being by enriching their lives, stimulating their minds, and allowing them to remain energetic and productive citizens of our community. The Committee further finds that since admission into a course(s) shall be on a space available basis or, if a course(s) if full, by permission of the instructor(s), no such additional appropriation to the University is necessary.

Recommendations

The Committee on Education, to which was referred **Bill No. 484**: "AN ACT TO AMEND §16125 OF TITLE 17 GUAM CODE ANNOTATED RELATIVE TO EXEMPTING RESIDENTS OF GUAM WHO ARE FIFTY-FIVE (55) YEARS OF AGE OR OLDER FROM TUITION LEVIED UPON STUDENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM," herein submits its findings and recommendation **TO DO PASS Substitute Bill No. 484**.

The General Fund revenues available for appropriation, as adopted in Public Law 24-59, is \$353,292,790 (includes \$7,600,000 Autonomous Agency Fund, \$7,000,000 Use Tax and \$36,000,000 in Section 30 funds). The appropriations for FY1998 in P.L. 24-59 is \$346,128,092 plus continuing appropriations for debt service of \$2,504,141 for a total appropriation against of \$348,632,234. Pursuant to P.L. 24-59, surplus FY1998 revenues available for appropriations is \$4.6M.

However, it should be noted that the expected combined collection from both the Autonomous Agency Fund and the Use Tax is only \$3.0M, a reduction of \$11.6M (\$14.6 - 3.0 = \$11.6). As such, \$341,739,919 in revenue less \$348,632,234 in appropriations leaves an expected shortfall of (\$6,892,315) as of P.L. 24-59.

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TESTIMONY ON BILL 484 - An Act relative to exempting residents of Guam, Age 55 and over, from tuition levied upon students of the University of Guam:

My Name is John M Phillips. I am a Senior Citizen, President of the National Association of Retired Federal Employees (NARFE) and Past President of The American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) and currently a member of the Board of Directors of AARP. I am also Chair of the Accounting Department at the University of Guam. I am a domicile of Santa Rita, a registered voter and a property owner.

I speak today both as a senior citizen and as an educator. I am in favor of enacting this provision back into law. A similar provision was repealed when the current law establishing the University Faculty & Administrators as a separate class of employees was enacted. I was a member of the University's Board of Regents that enacted the current University policy on Senior citizens in 1985.

First Senior citizens need the opportunity to enhance their knowledge, which in turn enhances their life. Senior citizens are not preparing for a new occupation. But, that should not stop them from acquiring additional knowledge, and enriching their lives.

Senior Citizens are not wealthy, especially on Guam. They are on a fixed or semi-fixed income and this income is needed for their living and medical expenses. Education is a luxury if one has to pay for it. The Senior citizen would have to forgo this needed item, but a luxury, in order to pay the rent, food and medical expenses.

As a faculty member I welcome senior citizens into my class. They provide real life experiences and maturity to the young students. They enhance the classes. Most upper level classes never are full, the senior citizen do not deprive the young of an educational opportunity by taking a space in a class.

There is no cost to the University. The seat is empty, instruction, overhead are paid for. The University gains as the senior pays fees and purchases books and supplies, which provide income to the University.

The Senior will be a recruiter for the University. They will tell their grandchildren and other family members about the opportunities available at the University. And they will encourage people to follow their example. Learning is a great way to overcome boredom. And there is always the possibility that they will leave monies to the University in their will.

Good Morning Mr. Chairman, distinguished Legislators, and members of the public:

My name is Joseph Rhatigan, a resident of this fair island of Guam for the past thirty years. I present myself today to testify very strongly in favor of Bill No. 484. Since I have devoted most of my life to helping and assisting others who are in need, I must also support this very commendable Bill and urge that it be enacted into law as soon as humanly possible.

Until very recently, the people of Guam, particularly the elderly or Manamko, were given the opportunity to further their education at very little expense other than the cost of books and related classroom items. It is through education that one grows and thus we are able to help, not only one's self, but others around us as well. Yes, Senators, this Bill, today, is a necessity. Through education, the welfare rolls can be diminished and the overall productivity of this Island can be greatly increased. This will be beneficial to young and old alike.

Once again, through the efforts of members of this Legislature, the elderly will be offered the prospect of seeking enrichment of their minds and their lives. Persons like myself, who could not afford to enroll at the University for full time classes, would have the possibility of attending certain classes such as computer classes, language classes and writing courses. This will enable myself to continue to help others (a task I set for myself many, many years ago.). I have always enjoyed helping those in need. and that we are concerned for their mental well being. It will be the culmination of the Golden Rule - "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you!"

Thank you all for having given me the opportunity today to express my heartfelt thoughts on this most worthy Bill. I eagerly look forward to its enactment!

AN ACT TO AMEND §16125 OF TITLE 17, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED RELATIVE TO EXEMPTING RESIDENTS OF GUAM FROM TUITION LEVIED UPON STUDENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM.

The Department of Public Health and Social Services, Division of Senior Citizens supports the intent of Bill No. 484 (COR), specifically the amendment exempting tuition to be levied upon any student admitted who is Fifty-five (55) years of age or older, provided that such individual meet the admission requirements of the University of Guam and are residents of Guam.

The proposed provision would allow senior citizens of our island to continue stimulating their minds and learn changes from our ever growing and dynamic society. Their presence in a classroom contributes in two major ways. First of all, their life experiences enrich classroom discussions and secondly, their acculturation to new ideas and practices bridges our generations. Buenas yan Saluda! In reference to the written testimony provided on Bill No. 484 (COR) on January 10, 1998, I am submitting clarification on the intended position with regards to student fees. The intended amendment is to waive and not impose student fees to those age fifty-five (55) years and older.

My department was represented by Mr. Arthur U. San Agustin, MHR, Administrator for the Division of Senior Citizens and was asked by Senator Aguon as to the intended written position of the department/division on this recommended provision to be added. From my understanding, Mr. San Agustin indicated that prior legislation exempted seniors from being assessed tuition and fees and it is the position of this department that such be afforded to our manamko.

I felt this clarification was important for me to express in a timely manner as your Committee further deliberates on the final version of Bill No. 484 (COR).

Dear Senator Kasperbaurer:

On behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Guam I would like to express our support for the primary intent of Bill 484 to exempt residents of Guam, age 55 years and older, from paying tuition. This proposition is consistent with a long standing policy of the University of Guam.

However, recent fiscal constraints have caused the Board to reevaluate this policy, although no change is planned. Consequently, since this measure calls for a statutory tuition exemption, we would request that an additional section be added containing an appropriation provision to cover the costs of implementation. Present costs of the tuition waiver plan now amounts to approximately \$50,000.00 per academic year.

I also note that under existing law and the provisions of Section 2. of the bill it is contemplated that resident tuition fees would be charged residents of the outerislands. I would recommend that that provision be further amended to allow for resident tuition only in the event that their respective institutions of higher learning reciprocate with an identical program for Guam residents.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Bill 484. I am ready to answer any further questions you may have concerning the Board of Regents' position on this measure.
