



- (2) peers or peeps into a window or other opening of a dwelling or other structure adapted for sojourn or overnight accommodations for the purpose of spying on the occupant thereof or invading the privacy of another person with a lewd or unlawful purpose, under circumstances in which a reasonable person in the dwelling or other structure would not expect to be observed;
- (3)trespasses on property for the sexual gratification of the actor;
- (4) installs or uses outside a private place any device for hearing, recording, amplifying, or broadcasting sounds originating in

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that place which would not ordinarily be audible or comprehensible outside, without the consent of the person or persons entitled to privacy therein;

- (5) intercepts, without the consent of the sender or receiver, a message or photographic image by telephone, telegraph, letter, electronic transmission, or other means of communicating privately; but this Subsection (5) *does not* apply to:
 - (A) overhearing of messages through a regularly installed instrument on a telephone party line or an extension; or
 - (B) interception by the telephone company, electronic mail account provider, or telephone or electronic mail subscriber incident to enforcement of regulations limiting use of the facilities or incident to other operation and use;
- (6) installs or uses, or both, in any private place or in a place where an individual has a reasonable expectation of privacy, without consent of the person or persons entitled to privacy therein, any means or device for observing, recording, amplifying, or broadcasting sounds or events in that place, including another person in a stage of undress or sexual activity;
- (7) covertly records or broadcasts an image of another person's intimate area underneath clothing, by use of any device, and that image is taken while that person is in a public place and without that person's consent;
- (8) divulges, without the consent of the sender or the receiver, the existence or contents of any messages or photographic image by telephone, telegraph, letter, electronic transmission, or other

means of communicating privately, if the accused knows that the message or photographic image was unlawfully intercepted or if the accused learned of the message or photographic image in the course of employment with an agency engaged in transmitting it; or

- (9) knowingly possesses materials created under circumstances prohibited in Subsection (b) below.
- (10) This Subsection (a) *shall not* apply to any dissemination, distribution, or transfer of images subject to this Subsection by an electronic communication service provider or remote storage service in the ordinary course of its business.
- (11) In addition to any penalties the court may impose, the court may order the destruction of any recording made in violation of this Subsection (a).
- (b) A person commits a felony in the third degree, if, except in the execution of a public duty or as authorized by law, when, with the intent of arousing, appealing to or gratifying the lust or passions or sexual desires of such person or another person, or for his own or another person's lascivious entertainment or satisfaction of prurient interest, or for the purpose of sexually degrading or abusing any other person, or for the purpose of annoying, harassing or intimidating any other person, the person intentionally or knowingly installs or uses, or both, in any private place or in a place where an individual has a reasonable expectation of privacy, without consent of the person or persons entitled to privacy therein, any device for observing, recording, amplifying, or broadcasting another person in a stage of undress or sexual activity. The court may order the destruction of any recording made in violation of this Subsection (b).

(c) A person commits the crime of video voyeurism, which is a felony in the second degree, if, except in the execution of a public duty or as authorized by law, when, with the intent of arousing, appealing to or gratifying the lust or passions or sexual desires of such person or another person, or for his own or another person's lascivious entertainment or satisfaction of prurient interest, or for the purpose of sexually degrading or abusing any other persons, or for the purpose of annoying, harassing or intimidating any other person, the person intentionally or knowingly disseminates, publishes or sells any image or images of the intimate areas of another person or persons without the consent of such other person or persons and with knowledge that such image or images were obtained. The court may order the destruction of any recording made in violation of this Subsection (c).

(d) Definitions for the purpose of this Section:

- (1) *broadcast* means the electronic transmittal of a visual image with the intent that it be viewed by a person or persons;
- (2) disseminate means to make available by any means to any person;
- (3) *electronic communication* means any transfer of signs, signals, writings, images, sounds, data, or intelligence of any nature transmitted in whole or part by a wire, radio, electromagnetic, photoelectronic, or photo optical system;
- (4) electronic communication service provider means any person engaged in the offering or sale of electronic communication services to the public;
- (5) electronic communication system means any wire, radio, electromagnetic, photo-optical, or photo-electronic facilities for the

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transmission of wire or electronic communications, and any computer facilities or related electronic equipment for the electronic storage of such communications, including e-mail, web hosting, multimedia messaging services, and remote storage services offered by an electronic communication service provider;

- (6) *imaging device* means any instrument capable of recording, storing, viewing or transmitting visual images;
- (7) *intimate areas* means any portion of a person's underwear, pubic area, anus, buttocks, vulva, genitals, or female breast;
- (8) intimate areas underneath clothing does not include intimate areas visible through a person's clothing or intimate areas exposed in public;
- (9) *person* means any natural person, corporation, partnership, firm, association, joint venture or any other recognized legal entity or any agent or servant thereof;
- (10) place where a person has a reasonable expectation of privacy means:
 - (A) a place where a reasonable person would believe that he could undress, be undressed or engage in sexual activity in privacy, without concern that he or she is being viewed, photographed, filmed or otherwise recorded by an imaging device; or
 - (B) a place where a person might reasonably expect to be safe from casual or hostile surveillance by an imaging device; or

Okay, I apologize Ms. Guzman is in the audience but she will be submitting written testimony subsequent to this hearing and so we still continue to recognized deputy chief attorney general Tydingco. "Thank you very much Mr. Chair. Mr. Chair, Bill No. 273-32 (COR) was introduced as a result of a conversation that I had with a person who was involved in an unfortunate situation where some might refer to as a peeping tom issue and it was broadcast in the media and long story short the folks involved the folks whose pictures were taken felt victimized over and over again and at the end the law had the person being indicted and convicted but the penalty was a misdemeanor and so we pulled it up and started looking at it and we worked with our attorney general office Mr. Tydingco and Mr. Quan and Lenny Rapadas met with us and we talked and he helped us with this language now already we've gotten 2 messages: one, that we need to do an technical amendment on the title and that will certainly be addressed and the other that we've got information that we need to define private place is what we are being advised. The deliberation of course is always happens through these mechanisms of the public hearings and mark ups even further deliberation on the floor. Today, 2014 the electronics, world of media technology has taken us to a certain place where it is everywhere and our laws have not moved to quickly as the technology has and so certainly we know that it is legal if someone wants to hire a private investigator to do some private work that's allowable and we know that we have cameras in certain places to capture what could be happening or might not be happening. We have them in banks, put in elevators, but this particular issue was in a bathroom and so the attorney general's office helped us craft the language to update it so that when it happens again the person may be penalized with stricter penalties that would hopefully as our attorney generals say here. There are four different reasons for going through the whole judgment issue and the whole penalty issue and one of it is retribution and one of it is to deterrence perhaps people saw that that kind of behavior is unacceptable and you will suffer the consequences or these kind of consequences perhaps it will deter along with doing a better job in raising our children so that they make better choices as they get older and so Mr. Chair, thank you for hearing our bill."

"Thank you very much Senator Yamashita. Deputy Chief Attorney General."

Phil Tydingco

"On behalf of the Office of the Attorney General Lenny Rapadas we support this bill and have been working with the senator on it. It does need some tweaking. This is always a process right? As stated in the legislative findings. This law was written long time ago and so it was only a misdemeanor and certain types of these acts especially serve electronic surveillance in a place where one should have a reasonable expectation of privacy which is probably the phrase that we should probably incorporate in the bill instead of saying private place you may want to tweak that a little bit. The first draft was done by the prosecutors and I waited a little bit later. Instead of saying "private place" it should say "where one has a reasonable expectation of privacy." I think they were just trying to tweak what is on the books. And certainly increase the penalty from a misdemeanor to a felony third degree where if you do the first tow types of misconduct that described in A1 and A2. I also sent additional language you may want to add another one where you know the person distributes. This covers because of the internet that's why these guys whoever these folks are. Their purpose is not to only have theses recordings for themselves, but you know they trade it on the internet. So you know we probably need to add another additional element of crime for those who do it for that purpose too the distribution or in front of the computer or so fourth. Who know who publishes or sells them. Again, we support updating and enhancing. It needs to be updated private place 30 years ago when we have an expectation of privacy. So it needs tweaking and updating so we support it. Thank you."

"Thank you very much AG Director Tydingco. Senator Aguon had just raised that the whole electronic distribution aspect and now I am wondering. You just raised something. The whole trading aspect. So the whole human trafficking part. How does this?"

Phil Tydingco

"Well, I think that the impetus case for this is more of a private thing. But I think the statute would be something along the lines. Somebody publishes or sells these images that were lawfully obtained and that's usually through the internet and that covers that kind of misconduct or offense or you also want the one who disseminates the image. So again we have the sexting statutes where with the young folks. The stranger folks now just publishing it through their smart phones."

"So does that, I know the legislatures have done a better and better job at protecting our young and growing children. Now I am wondering if we can maybe meet again because it's not only criminally wrong if you're just a child. It's also very wrong if you're and adult."

Phil Tydingco

"I think if we had the mark up whoever disseminates the image element in here cause I don't know how big the numbers are there's also the classic boyfriend/girlfriend breaks up and he/she is a jerk you know whatever folks do privately for their period of interest. They photograph themselves and then break up and that person decides to have their revenge. I'm going to shame you through the internet; I'm going to send it to all my friends. So I think if we add that there we'll be able to if you turn that conduct because it's not punishable. And certainly our statute should have the ability to do that because they weren't able to do that in the 20th century and it's a 21st century thing."

Ladies and gentlemen like wise on 273 the committee will continue to receive testimony for the subsequent 10 calendar days from the date of this public hearing. (d) Definitions for the purpose of this Section:

- (i) "Broadcast" means the electronic transmittal of a visual image with the intent that it be viewed by a person or persons.

- (iii) "Electronic communication" means any transfer of signs, signals, writing, images, sounds, data, or intelligence of any nature transmitted in whole or part by a wire, radio, electromagnetic, photoelectronic, or photo
- optical system.

(iv) "Electronic communication service provider" means any person engaged in the offering or sale of electronic communication services to the public.

- (v) "Electronic communication system" means any wire, radio, electromagnetic, photo-optical, or photo-electronic facilities for the transmission of wire or electronic communications, and any computer facilities or related electronic equipment for the electronic storage of such communications, including e-mail, web hosting, multimedia messaging services, and remote storage services offered by an electronic communication service provider.
 - (vi) "Imaging device" means any instrument capable of recording, storing, viewing or transmitting visual images.
 - (vii) "Intimate areas" means any portion of a person's underwear, pubic area, anus, buttocks, vulva, genitals, or female breast.
 - (viii) "Intimate areas underneath clothing" does not include intimate areas visible through a person's clothing or intimate areas exposed in public.
 - (ix) "Person" means any natural person, corporation, partnership,

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

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



Guam - A new measure introduced by Senator Aline Yamashita would toughen the penalties against anyone convicted of invading another person's privacy.

In a release, Senator Yamashita cites the recent case of a man convicted of installing a camera in the women's bathroom at eh Bank of Guam, he was only convicted of a misdemeanor. Senator Yamshita says her Bill #273 would make such acts a felony.

"Several jurisdictions have 'Peeping Tom' laws that make violations felonies", says Yamashita in a release. "Currently, this invasion of privacy for sexual gratification through recording instruments is only a misdemeanor in Guam."

Recently a man was convicted in local Court for being a peeping tom after he installed cameras in the women's restrooms of a local banking institution capturing thousands of images. Yet, he was only convicted of a misdemeanor crime.

This injustice to the victims prompted Senator Aline A.Yamashita, PhD, to introduce, today, Bill No. 273 -along with colleagues, Speaker Judith T. Won Pat, Ed.D., and Senator Tina Rose Muna Barnes- to make such an act a felony as part of Guam's invasion of privacy laws. The senator thanks the Office of the Attorney General who has been instrumental in the measure's design.

"With criminal acts come consequences," says Yamashita. "As a victim spoke about the ugliness of the crime, I listened and as she spoke of the unfairness of the penalty, I told her we would do something about it."

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guahan finds that 2 the community of Guam is disturbed that its laws have not kept pace with audio, 3 video and electronic digital camera technology which, though designed to heighten 4 the quality of life, can also be used for nefarious or perverse purposes. I Liheslatura 5 further finds that recently, a man, convicted for using electronic audio/video 6 technology or cameras to engage in surreptitious surveillance of women using 7 restroom facilities, only faced a misdemeanor penalty. The victims in this case 8 suffered not only a gross and severe invasion of their privacy, but a violation of their 9 personal and physical dignity, in addition to other psychological harm. 10

- 2 mind the need to balance privacy rights in circumstances where surveillance may be

- Section 2. Section 70.35 of Chapter 70 of Title 9, Guam Code Annotated, is
- 5 hereby repealed:
- 6 § 70.35. Invasion of Privacy: Penalty; Definitions.
- 7 (a) A person commits a misdemeanor if, except as authorized by law, if he:
- 8 (1) trespasses on property with intent to subject anyone to eavesdropping or other
- 9 surveillance in a private place;
- 10 (2) installs in any private place, without the consent of the person or persons entitled
- to privacy there, any device for observing, photographing, recording, amplifying or
- broadcasting sounds or events in such place, or uses any such unauthorized
- 13 installation;
- 14 (3) installs or uses outside a private place any device for hearing, recording,
- amplifying or broadcasting sounds originating in such place which would not
- ordinarily be audible or comprehensible outside, without the consent of the person
- or persons entitled to privacy there;
- 18 (4) intercepts without the consent of the sender or receiver a message by telephone,
- 19 telegraph, letter or other means of communicating privately; but this Paragraph does
- 20 not extend to:

15	(a) A person commits a misdemeanor if, except as authorized by law, he:	
16	(1) Knowing that he is not licensed or privileged to do so, enters or	
17	surreptitiously remains on property for the intent to subject anyone to	
18	eavesdropping or to non-consented observation in a private place; or	

(2) Knowing that he is not licensed or privileged to do so, looks through a hole or opening of a bedroom, bathroom, changing room, fitting room, dressing room or the interior of any other area in which the occupant has a reasonable expectation of privacy, with the intent to subject the occupant to non-consented observations; or

- (3) Installs in any private place any devise for observing, photographic, recording, amplifying or broadcasting sounds or events in such private place, without the consent of at least one person entitled to privacy there or the owner or possessor of such private place; or
- (4) Installs in any private place any device for hearing, recording, amplifying, or broadcasting sounds originated in such private place which would not ordinarily be audible or comprehensible of at least one person entitled to privacy there or the owner or possessor of such private place; or
- (5) Intercepts without the consent of the sender or receiver a message by telephone, telegraph, letter or other means of communicating privately; but this paragraph does not extend to:
 - (A) overhearing of messages through a regularly installed instrument on a telephone party line or on an extension; or

- 1 (B) interception by the telephone company or subscriber incident to
 2 enforcement of regulations limiting use of the facilities or to other
 3 normal operation and use; or
- (6) Divulges without the consent of the sender or receiver the existence of contents of any message described in paragraph (4) if the defendant knows that the message was illegally intercepted, or if he learned of the message in the course of employment with an agency engaged in transmitting it.
- 8 (b) Whoever uses or attempts to use any device for hearing, observing,
 9 photographing, recording, amplifying or broadcasting in violation of (a)(1) or (a)(2)
 10 *supra*, is guilty of a felony of the third degree.
- Section 4. Effective Date. This Act shall become effective upon enactment.
- Section 5. Severability. *If* any of the provisions of this law or its application to any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such invalidity *shall* not affect other provisions or applications of this law which can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application, and to this end the provisions of this law are severable
