Public Law No. 32-174

1 It is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to prohibit a person from
2 using specified protected computers to relay or retransmit commercial
3 electronic mail messages with the intent to deceive or mislead recipients, or
4 an electronic mail service provider under specified circumstances; to
5 prohibit a person from materially falsifying header information in
6 commercial electronic mail messages under specified circumstances; to
7 prohibit a person from registering for electronic mail accounts or domain
8 names under specified circumstances; and to provide for specified penalties
9 and fines.

10 **§ 46.501. Definitions.**

11 In this Act, the following words have the meanings indicated:

12 (a) *commercial electronic mail message* means an electronic
13 message sent primarily for the purpose of commercial advertisement
14 or promotion of:

- 15 (1) a commercial product;
16 (2) a commercial service;
17 (3) the content on an Internet website; or
18 (4) a website operated for a commercial purpose;

19 (b) *domain name* means any alphanumeric designation that is
20 registered with or assigned by a domain name registrar, domain name
21 registry, or other domain name registration authority as part of an
22 electronic mail address on the internet;

23 (c) *electronic mail service provider* means any person,
24 including an internet service provider, that is an intermediary in
25 sending and receiving electronic mail, and that provides to the public
26 the ability to send or receive electronic mail to or from an electronic
27 mail account or online user account;

1 (d) *financial institution* means any financial institution of the
2 type supervised under 11GCA, whether or not locally-chartered;

3 (e) *header information* means the source, destination, and
4 routing information attached to an electronic mail message, including
5 the originating domain name and originating electronic mails, and any
6 other information that appears in the line identifying or purporting to
7 identify a person initiating the message, and technical information that
8 authenticates the sender of an electronic mail message for network
9 security or network management purposes;

10 (f) the term *initiate*, when used with respect to a commercial
11 electronic mail message, means to originate or transmit the message
12 or to procure the origination or transmission of the message, and *does*
13 *not* include actions that constitute routine conveyances of such
14 message;

15 (g) *internet* means the international computer network of
16 both federal and nonfederal interoperable packet switched data
17 networks;

18 (h) *internet protocol address* means the string of numbers by
19 which a location on the internet is identified by routers or other
20 computers connected to the internet;

21 (i) *materially falsified* means altered or concealed in a
22 manner that would impair the ability of one of the following to
23 identify, locate, or respond to a person who initiated an electronic
24 mail message or to investigate an alleged violation of this Act:

25 (1) a recipient of the message;

26 (2) an internet access service processing the message
27 on behalf of a recipient;

1 (3) a person alleging a violation of this Act; or

2 (4) a law enforcement agency;

3 (j) *multiple* means:

4 (1) more than ten (10) commercial electronic mail
5 messages during a twenty four (24)-hour period;

6 (2) more than one hundred (100) commercial
7 electronic mail messages during a thirty (30)-day period; or

8 (3) more than one thousand (1,000) commercial
9 electronic mail messages during a one (1)-year period;

10 (k) *protected computer* means a computer used in intrastate
11 or interstate communication;

12 (l) *routine conveyance* means the transmission, routing,
13 relaying, handling, or storing, through an automatic technical process,
14 of an electronic mail message for which another person has identified
15 the recipients or provided the recipients' addresses.

16 **§ 46.502. Violations.** A person *may not* conspire to or knowingly:

17 (a) use a protected computer of another to relay or retransmit
18 multiple commercial electronic mail messages with the intent to
19 deceive or mislead recipients or an electronic mail service provider as
20 to the origin of the message;

21 (b) materially falsify header information in multiple
22 commercial electronic mail messages and intentionally initiate the
23 transmission of the messages;

24 (c) register, using information that materially falsifies the
25 identity of the actual registrant, for fifteen (15) or more electronic
26 mail accounts or on-line user accounts of two or more domain names,
27 and intentionally initiate the transmission of multiple commercial

1 electronic mail messages from one or any combination of accounts or
2 domain names;

3 (d) falsely represent the right to use five (5) or more internet
4 protocol addresses and intentionally initiate the transmission of
5 multiple commercial electronic mail messages from the internet
6 protocol addresses;

7 (e) access a protected computer of another without
8 authorization, and intentionally initiate the transmission of multiple
9 electronic mail advertisements from or through the protected
10 computer;

11 (f) violate Subsections (a), (b), (c), (d) or (e) of this Section
12 by providing or selecting addresses to which a message was
13 transmitted, knowing that:

14 (1) the electronic mail addresses of the recipients were
15 obtained using an automated means from an internet website or
16 proprietary online service operated by another person; and

17 (2) the website or online service included, at the time
18 the addresses were obtained, a notice stating that the operator of
19 the website or online service will *not* transfer addresses
20 maintained by the website or online service to any other party
21 for the purposes of initiating or enabling others to initiate
22 electronic mail messages; or

23 (g) violate Subsections (a), (b), (c), (d) or (e) of this Section
24 by providing or selecting electronic mail addresses of recipients
25 obtained using an automated means that generates possible electronic
26 mail addresses by combining names, letters, or numbers into
27 numerous permutations.

1 **§ 46.503. Penalties.**

2 (a) A person who violates § 46.502 (a), (b), (c), (d) or (e) is
3 guilty of a third degree felony, and upon conviction is subject to
4 imprisonment not to exceed three (3) years or a fine not to exceed
5 Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or both.

6 (b) A person who violates § 46.502 (a), (b), (c), (d) or (e)
7 involving the transmission of more than two hundred fifty (250)
8 commercial electronic mail messages during a twenty-four (24) hour
9 period; two thousand five hundred (2,500) commercial electronic mail
10 messages during any thirty (30)-day period; or twenty five thousand
11 (25,000) commercial electronic mail messages during any one (1)-
12 year period is guilty of a second degree felony, and upon conviction is
13 subject to imprisonment not to exceed five (5) years or a fine not to
14 exceed Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000), or both.

15 (c) A person who violates § 46.502 (c) or (d) involving
16 twenty (20) or more electronic mail accounts, or ten (10) or more
17 domain names, and intentionally initiates the transmission of multiple
18 commercial electronic mail messages from the accounts or using the
19 domain names is guilty of a second degree felony, and upon
20 conviction is subject to imprisonment not to exceed five (5) years or a
21 fine not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000), or both.

22 (d) A person who violates § 46.502 (a), (b), (c), (d) or (e)
23 that causes a loss of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) or more during
24 any one (1)-year period is guilty of a felony, and upon conviction is
25 subject to imprisonment not to exceed three (3) years or a fine not to
26 exceed Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or both.

1 (e) A person who violates § 46.502 (a), (b), (c), (d) or (e) in
2 concert with three (3) or more other persons as the leader or organizer
3 of the action that constitutes the violation is guilty of a second degree
4 felony, and upon conviction is subject to imprisonment not to exceed
5 five (5) years or a fine not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000),
6 or both.

7 (f) A person who violates § 46.502 (a), (b), (c), (d) or (e) in
8 furtherance of a felony, or who has previously been convicted of an
9 offense under the laws of Guam, another state, or under any federal
10 law involving the transmission of multiple commercial electronic mail
11 messages is guilty of a second degree felony, and upon conviction is
12 subject to imprisonment not to exceed ten (10) years or a fine not to
13 exceed Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000), or both.

14 (g) A person who violates § 46.502 (f) or (g) is guilty of a
15 felony, and upon conviction is subject to imprisonment not to exceed
16 one (1) year or a fine not to exceed Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000),
17 or both.

18 **§ 46.504. Forfeiture.** In addition to any other sentence authorized
19 by law, the court may direct that a person convicted of a violation of §
20 46.502 forfeit to the government of Guam:

21 (a) any moneys and other income, including all proceeds
22 earned but not yet received by a defendant from a third party as a
23 result of the defendant's violation of § 46.502; and

24 (b) all computer equipment, computer software, and personal
25 property used in connection with a violation of this section known by
26 the owner to have been used in violation of § 46.502.

27 **§ 46.505. Civil Action by Attorney General.**

1 (a) An action brought under this Subsection *shall* be
2 commenced within two (2) years after the commission of the act.

3 (b) The Attorney General may institute a civil action against
4 a person who violates § 46.502 to recover a civil penalty not to
5 exceed:

6 (1) \$25,000 per day of violation; or

7 (2) *not less than* Two Dollars (\$2.00) nor more than
8 Eight Dollars (\$8.00) per commercial electronic mail message
9 initiated in violation of § 46.502.

10 (3) For any violation of this Act, the amount
11 determined under paragraph (b) may *not* exceed Two Million
12 Dollars (\$2,000,000).

13 (c) The Attorney General may seek an injunction in a civil
14 action to prohibit a person who has engaged in or is engaged in a
15 violation of § 46.502 from engaging in the violation.

16 (4) The Attorney General may enforce criminal violations of
17 this Act.

18 **§ 46.506. Lawfulness of Electronic Mail Service Provider**
19 **Policies.** Nothing in this Act shall be construed to have any effect on the
20 lawfulness of the adoption, implementation, or enforcement by an electronic
21 mail service provider of a policy of declining to transmit, route, relay,
22 handle, or store certain types of electronic mail messages under any other
23 provision of law.

24 **§ 46.507. Severability.** *If* any provision of this Act or its
25 application to any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary
26 to law, such invalidity *shall not* affect other provisions or application of this

1 Act which can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application,
2 and to this end the provisions of this Act are severable.”




